#### From the Minister

"Be still, and know that I am God." - Psalm 46:10 KJV

Dear friends.

2017 is going to be another year of anniversaries. Two of the events were, in their different ways, massively significant. A hundred years ago, this October, saw the final triumph of the Russian Revolution and, five hundred years ago, also in October, Martin Luther sparked off the Reformation when he nailed his 95 Theses, criticisms of the Church of his day, to the door of the church at Wittenberg

Just twenty years before Luther's world-changing gesture and just five years after Christopher Columbus, a little wooden sailing ship left Bristol and, fifty days later, made landfall somewhere on the coast of North America. Like Columbus' ships, *The Matthew* was a caravel, a Portuguese design that first made such voyages possible. It had a crew of just eighteen men, including the captain Sebastian Cabot. It was an age of Faith and no doubt they felt safer because the little craft in which they were braving the unknown was named after an Apostle and Evangelist.

Even now, in spite of technological advances, there is the occasional tragedy to remind us that any kind of sea voyage is a huge act of faith; casting yourself onto a vast and unpredictable expanse of water so deep that a human body would be crushed by the pressure before reaching the bottom. (If you have a sea voyage planned, pleased don't be put off – after all, flying seems even more preposterous and we can get used to that fairly easily!)

A replica of *The Matthew* is docked at Bristol, as is its much younger, and bigger, sister, the SS Great Britain – the first all-iron, screw-propelled ship to make the same journey, in 1845 – in just fourteen days!

"Peace, be still" - Mark 4:39 KJV

Not so accessible is the vastly bigger, faster and even more celebrated *Titanic*, hailed as the ultimate achievement in maritime technology, Confidence in its safety is summed up in the assurance to passengers that 'even God couldn't sink this ship'!

I don't think for a moment that the fate of the *Titanic* was some kind of Divine retribution, but it does remind us to have great respect for the 'cruel sea' that is totally unconcerned about the humans that venture into its domain.

The New Testament takes us into the realm of stormy waters and the perils of the deep. Acts offers a graphic description of storm and shipwreck that deposited the Apostle Paul on the shore of Malta, whilst the Gospels recount the terrifying storm on Lake Galilee that Jesus quelled with a word.

In both cases, the key word is Faith: Paul told the crew and passengers to trust in God who had shown him that none of them would perish while Jesus rebuked his disciples for their little faith.

Another feature of this, still quite new, year is uncertainty, apprehension of stormy waters ahead matched by fear, anger, resentment and recrimination; old certainties are crumbling around us and the future seems unknown and menacing.

If we feel that the wheels of history are turning then it is the God of history turning them and what we don't yet understand, we can only approach in hope and trust. We are given those words of Scripture to say to us, in the face of the unknown, 'Don't be afraid – have Faith'!

#### Women's World Day of Prayer 2017

The local service for the Women's World Day of Prayer will be held at our church on Friday 3<sup>rd</sup> March starting at 2.00pm. Refreshments will be served afterwards. Please join us.



On Friday 3<sup>rd</sup> March, over 5,000 services will be held in the British Isles on the theme of 'Am I Being Unfair to You?' The Christian women of the Philippines have written the service and it has been translated into 1,000 different languages and dialects, to be used, throughout the whole world, starting at sunrise over the island of Samoa and continuing until sunset off the coast of American Samoa.

In 2013, Typhoon Haiyan - named locally as 'Yolanda' – struck the Philippine Islands in the western Pacific Ocean. This was the most severe storm ever to hit land and it

claimed thousands of lives. The typhoon is mentioned in the service but you will also hear the stories of a girl, a mother and an older woman, recounting their situations and their hopes and fears. The service focuses on the Bible story of the workers in the vineyard: Matthew 20 v 1-16. There is also reflection on the artwork designed by Rowena 'Apol' Laxamana-Sta.Rosa.

#### The Philippines

**Background** – The Philippines comprises a group of islands located on the Pacific Ring of Fire close to the equator. This contributes to the high incidence of typhoons and earthquakes (around 20 per year.) Climate change has led to an increase in storms, droughts and severe typhoons.

Politics – The Philippines is a constitutional republic with a democratic government led by the President. However, the predominantly Muslim island of Mindanao has its own autonomous regional government.17% of elected government posts are filled by women. There have been two women presidents – Corazon Aquino and Gloria Arroyo, both of whom come from families with a long political tradition.

**Women** – Before Spanish colonisation in the 16<sup>th</sup> century, women occupied some status in the community. However, the Spanish introduced feudalism, leading to the subordination of women throughout the archipelago. Today many Filipino women take on the role of breadwinner, often

working abroad as service crew, domestic helpers or skilful professionals in the medical field. The Philippine Constitution provides for equal rights, yet in practice Filipino women are often discriminated against and treated as subordinates in the home, in the church and in society.

**Education** – Public education is sponsored by the government but there are also private schools. Children start school at age 4 and elementary public schools are free.

**Economy** – The Philippines is one of the fastest growing Asian economies with labour migration a major economic force. This has impacted on the social fabric of the country. Ninety per cent of domestic workers are women – of which the majority work in the Gulf countries. Primary exports include semiconductors, coconut oil, fruits, garments and products relating to electronics, transport, copper and petroleum. Tourism accounts for 10% of national employment and contributes to almost 6% of the Philippine GDP.

#### **News from Churches Together in Hadleigh**

The latest meeting of Churches Together was held at our church on Tue 10<sup>th</sup> Jan 2017

**Opening** – The meeting was chaired by Major David Woodman, leader of Churches Together. The meeting opened at 7.30pm with some thoughts on the Epiphany and a prayer by our minster, Rev Jack Roche.

**Treasurer's Report -** Paul Short reported that the Churches Together Christmas cards cost £25 to print. The current bank balance is £159.36. With the closure of the HSBC Bank in Hadleigh, it was agreed that the account could be transferred to Lloyds Bank.

**Lent Course** – It was agreed to follow the York Course *Receiving Christ*. The following dates and locations were arranged for sessions 1-3 and 5:

#### News from around the churches

*Methodist* - A new male Youth Worker has been employed, to be shared with Benfleet Methodist and Wesley Methodist churches. He will be assisted by his wife and will run bible clubs in schools and encourage children to attend clubs at the churches. The Hadleigh Methodist club will be held on Sunday evening at 6.00pm.

*St Barnabas* – Ann Lowes reported that she had retired from Open the Book. More volunteers are needed. Ann mentioned that Hadleigh Junior School now hold assemblies at 3.00pm which is not a good time.

Salvation Army - The rebuilt cottages are to be officially opened on 16<sup>th</sup> January. They will be used initially for a job club and for Family Mosaic surgeries. An Alpha Course starting on Friday 20<sup>th</sup> January will also use the cottages.

#### Feasts & Festivals

The following article is based on material from the United Reformed Church website.



2017 is a year of celebration, a year for the whole United Reformed Church to celebrate all that we have been, are now and are called to be as we

continue walking the way of Jesus Christ today. It's 500 years since the Lutheran Reformation, 100 years since the ordination of Constance Coltman, the first woman to enter congregational ministry, 45 years since the URC came into being, more than 80 years since Pilots started and 25 years since Commitment for Life began. So, let's celebrate! And, in doing so, let's think about who we are, what we're about and how we can support one another as we all, in our own ways and contexts, seek to be better disciples of Jesus.

Every family has its own way of marking special events such as birthdays or Christmas. Some gather for a special meal, some give gifts. Whatever the means we use, these events remind us of who we belong to, where we have come from and what we can bring to the future. For a lot of people, the events of 2016 make the whole idea of 'celebrating' anything difficult to grasp. The world's peoples seem further apart, with walls rather than bridges being talked about by political leaders. Yet in different times and places, God's people have been called to 'drink deeply of the wells of salvation' (Isaiah 12:3). When we drill down deep into God's Word, we find a stream of refreshment to counter weariness and renew our hope for the refashioning of society.

For every month of 2017, as part of our focus on Feasts and Festivals, there will be Bible passages, brief reflections and worship materials, together with ideas to carry out into the wider community. The material has been crafted by people across the spectrum of the Church in the hope that you and your church will find something there to support you in your life together. One of the earliest Christian communications is believed to have been written from prison by the apostle Paul to the community at Philippi. The letter, although written at a time of threat for the Church, is marked by rejoicing. A spirit of joyful confidence in Christ will hopefully mark our anniversaries and celebrations in 2017 while shaping the attitude with which we face whatever the year will bring. Beyond 2017 lies our new emphasis on adventurous discipleship: Walking the Way – living the life of Jesus today. May we 'drink deeply' and rejoice in 2017 and beyond.

#### January - Celebrating one Church

'Towards a Charter for Children in the Church' says that the United Reformed Church will only do separately those things which cannot, in all good conscience, be done together. While in this the context of the charter it relates to children and young people it does also directly refer to how we get along with our fellow Christian denominations. And we do a LOT of things together! Street Pastors, Food Banks, asylum seeker and refugee projects are just a few examples of where Christians in different local denominations put aside their differences and work together for God's Kingdom.

Praying and working with other churches for the visible unity of the whole Church is second nature for the United Reformed Church. The United Reformed Church came into being in 1972 through the union of the Presbyterian Church of England and the majority of churches in the Congregational Church in England and Wales. In 1981, we joined with the Re-formed Association of the Churches of Christ and in 2000 with the Congregational Union of Scotland. We also have strong relationships with Churches and Christian organisations around the world, including the Council for World Mission, World Communion of Reformed Churches and the World Council of Churches.

The Church worldwide celebrates a Week of Prayer for Christian Unity each year from 18<sup>th</sup>-25<sup>th</sup> January. Locally, Churches Together in Hadleigh organised several prayer meetings on the theme of reconciliation, using material prepared by Christians in Germany and based on 2 Corinthians 5:14-20. Our oneness in Christ was also celebrated with a pulpit exchange on the morning of Sunday 22<sup>nd</sup> January and united Songs of Praise service in the evening.

#### February - Rejoicing in our intercultural Church

For many years, hundreds of URC members have gathered for multicultural celebration. Every other September since 2007, Christians from England, Scotland and Wales have come together with Christians from Ghana, Korea, Jamaica, Nigeria and many others to celebrate the rich tapestry that makes up the United Reformed Church. It is a joyous gathering with lots of singing, dancing, story telling and poetry. There is a story award and an art competition. And most of all there is food, hot, tasty and plentiful.

We acknowledge that we need to do more than celebrate our multicultural church, the URC maintains that justice and love must be at the centre of all our intercultural ministry, in order to challenge all that opposes the fullness of life in Christ. Enabling racial justice advocates, supporting and enabling ethnic minority lay and ordained ministers, and becoming better host churches – are just some of the ways in which we have been living out our commitment to rejoice in the gifts of our members and show that the love of God is radical and inclusive.

We therefore continue to find new ways, models and tools to rejoice and embrace the diversity of humanity, and we invite you to journey with us, step outside of your cultural comfort zone and reflect on what it means to be a truly inclusive church...

#### Reflect together

As a church, or in groups, read Luke 10:25-37.

- Ask ourselves who do we identify with in the text and discuss with each other the social and religious barriers that are apparent in this narrative.
- What are the barriers before us that limit our ability as churches to be embracing of all groups – particularly those who have been marginalised throughout history?
- How can we engage in truly mutual relationships that embody and express the full range of voices and gifts present in the URC and wider communities?
- Do we have the systems in place to invite and welcome people – especially those on the margins of society – to ensure that all are welcome, and all gifts and perspectives are heard, visible and valued in our congregations, ministries and structures?

#### Continuing to reflect

Feasts and Festivals are important in the Bible. They are the focus of community life from the very beginning. Anything important that happens seems to have a feast or a festival. When a battle is won there is a feast. When God does something the community wants to remember and celebrate there is a festival, and that involves eating too. Here are some ideas to help us start exploring the eating and celebrating in the Old Testament.

When Abraham and Sarah receive three strange guests at the Oaks of Mamre (Genesis 18) Abraham seems to know it is the LORD. He makes them welcome and lays on a feast. The best flour is baked and a tender calf is cooked. After the eating and drinking Sarah who, like Abraham, is by now very old, overhears one of the visitors telling Abraham that she will have a son.

Being attentive to God is important and eating together is one way to do that. When we gather around a table we practice (in both senses of the word) hospitality and openness, compassion and gratitude, love and care.

Food, dancing and music are central to the life of the Jewish people. The central act of Jewish faith is the Passover Feast, where they remember God freeing the Hebrew slaves from Egypt. For Christians this meal is also important because during it Jesus took bread and wine and gave them new meaning. We call this feast Communion or the Eucharist.

As the newly freed Hebrews wandered in the wilderness, they ran out of food but God provided all that they needed (Exodus 16:2-20). Manna, bread from heaven, appeared for every day each morning. It had to be used or it would go bad. We pray for 'our daily bread' in the Lord's Prayer. Like those wilderness wanderers we learn that God provides food for the journey.

Psalm 23 speaks of a table groaning with food prepared in front of all our foes and a cup overflowing with goodness and mercy. Psalm 150 encourages us to sing and dance and play music to praise God. This month you could:

- think about how you welcome and entertain uninvited guests;
- look ahead in your church diary and plan a special meal;
- think about including those who never usually get invited.

#### **Prayer Reflection**

"When Winter comes can Spring be far behind." - Shelley ~ Ode to the West Wind

Give thanks that the darkness and cold are receding, although winter does not officially end until March and it can still deliver unexpected and unwelcome surprises. If we can't actually rejoice in 'deep freeze' conditions then we can at least give thanks that it cleanses the earth of pests and bugs that trouble human as well as plant organisms. Then it is the change in soil temperature that triggers germination of the seed that has been lying in the cold earth all winter.

When I have come home, gratefully, to a warm house in the recent icy conditions, my thoughts have strayed to those who are, somehow, surviving out on the streets, with nowhere else to sleep, and I have felt better because we regularly support the Southend HARP project. The warmer weather may improve the lot of the homeless from impossible to tolerable but, if we fear that

we may 'lose out' from 'Brexit' or from anything else, spare a thought for those who won't because they have nothing left to lose!

Barnabas Fund, MSF and other care agencies continue to report the plight of refugees from Syria who are still being accommodated in, mostly, tented camps in Lebanon, Turkey and Jordan. For many, their experiences will have made them reluctant to return home, in spite of recent peace discussions. Adequate food, shelter and clothing are in short supply and Middle Eastern winters can be bitterly cold.

#### Showers of Blessings – a post by Kevin Watson from 26<sup>th</sup> Jan 2017



This is the first home we have lived in with an ensuite bathroom — certainly a first world blessing! Unfortunately the shower looks as though it suits more the

showers that my dad had at the pit-head baths, and didn't work much better either – fixed in one position from the ceiling, giving a blast of water that felt as though your skin was being stripped away, and at a temperature only I could bear. For eight years I managed to use it, but in the Autumn it finally broke and parts could not be found!

Sometimes the Lord provides by taking away! It was agreed that a new shower could be fitted. It then proved difficult to get quotes, let alone a workman prepared to do the job. Eventually a plan was in place but it required a tiler to come and remove the old shower and tiles, then return later when the installation is finished; an electrician to wire it all up; and the plumber to put the shower in! It even needs me as a volunteer to take all the rubbish to the tip, and Lynne to keep the craftsmen plied with refreshments.

Five people needed to install a shower, each needed with different skill sets, but needing to coordinate their time and work together to make it happen with the result – a bathroom fit for purpose and looking good! There must be a message here for the Church – when something is shown not to be fit for purpose, even broken – let's pull together and pool the resources God has given us to repair the old or even create the new, and restore the beauty of God's world.

It's the same whether a door needs attention in a church building, or whether modern slavery needs eradicating from the face of the world.

We watched again the very inspiring film, "Amazing Grace" – the story of William Wilberforce's fight against the slave trade and then slavery itself. Someone who saw this at the cinema said how they wanted to stand and cheer when the victory was won!

Although Wilberforce is certainly an inspiring figure himself, what comes over so powerfully is that it took many people to be committed to the cause, and to work and plan and sacrifice together – a hard fight, but it was possible when they were one in Spirit. For that's how God's Spirit works, working in individual lives, giving us all different talents and characters, and then working in, and through and beyond the Church as individuals are prepared to come together.

I know that as we begin to "Walk the Way" and rediscover what Discipleship means, we will see that discipleship is not just an individual's faith journey, but is a shared experience of Christians living Christ's risen life together.

Ezekiel looks forward to this time, when the Lord says, "I will make them and the places surrounding my hill a blessing. I will send down showers in season; there will be showers of blessing. The trees will yield their fruit and the ground will yield its crops; the people will be secure in their land. They will know that I am the Lord, when I break the bars of their yoke and rescue them from the hands of those who enslaved them......Then they will know that I, the Lord their God, am with them and that they, the Israelites, are my people, declares the Sovereign Lord.
